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

### Here are a few old favorites reimagined:


- The **Big Idea** is the main point of the lesson (replacing the Purpose).










### To Live Is Christ

**Lesson Text: Philippians 1:12-26** 







Big Idea: Living for Jesus should be our number one aim our whole life.

### **Prepare Your Mind**

Paul was imprisoned in Rome around A.D. 60-61. This would have placed him in Rome while Nero was emperor, and Nero was infamous for his persecution of Christians, especially after a terrible fire destroyed much of Rome in A.D. 64. Nero blamed the fire on Christians. However, Nero may have deliberately torched the city himself and simply used Christians as a scapegoat. Christian tradition holds that both Peter and Paul were killed after this fire. Many historians believe that Nero had Paul put to death a few years after Paul had written the epistle known as the book of Philippians. Early church tradition also holds that Nero crucified Peter upside down but beheaded Paul since he was a Roman citizen. God prepared Paul to die for the sake of Christ, which becomes evident in this week's lesson as Paul expressed his desire to be with Christ while also longing to continue in his ministry to God's people.

### **Prepare Your Heart**

The circumstances in Paul's life were dire, but his attitude was filled with unbounding optimism. Some people were trying to stir up trouble for him while he was in chains, but Paul chose to look at the bigger picture. He saw that Christ was being preached even though some people had false motives. When faced with difficulties, you might ask yourself, "What good can come out of this painful situation?" Remember, God often turns problems into opportunities that can be used for His glory (Rom. 8:28). For example, our salvation was accomplished through Jesus' death on the cross. God used His Son's suffering to bring us the gift of eternal life. When faced with chains and an uncertain future, Paul chose to rejoice and trust in the Lord. His example in the face of hardship is an encouragement for us to continue rejoicing and to keep trusting the Lord through our struggles.
