

God cares about our thinking, feeling, and doing. In this first unit, we look at biblical thinking. Simply listing rules or abstract ideas would not engage students' imaginations or be memorable. Thankfully, God provides us with good examples to imitate and bad examples to learn from. The biblical accounts are memorable and helpful. God urges us to seek His wisdom and to cling to the good news that we are saved by grace through faith in Christ, not through our works. There are many things your students do not yet understand, but make sure they understand the gospel!







Learn from Good Examples

Lesson Text: Hebrews 11:1-2, 4-13



Without faith it is impossible to please [God] (Hebrews 11:6).



Big Idea: We can learn from godly people in the Bible how to trust God.

HEBREWS 11:1 Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen.

- **2** For by it the elders obtained a good report.
- 4 By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, by which he obtained witness that he was righteous, God testifying of his gifts: and by it he being dead yet speaketh.
- **5** By faith Enoch was translated that he should not see death; and was not found, because God had translated him: for before his translation he had this testimony, that he pleased God.
- **6** But without faith *it is* impossible to please *him:* for he that cometh to God must believe that he is, and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him.
- 7 By faith Noah, being warned of God of things not seen as yet, moved with fear, prepared an ark to the saving of his house; by the which he condemned the world, and became heir of the righteousness which is by faith.
 - **8** By faith Abraham, when he was called to go out into a

- place which he should after receive for an inheritance, obeyed; and he went out, not knowing whither he went.
- **9** By faith he sojourned in the land of promise, as *in* a strange country, dwelling in tabernacles with Isaac and Jacob, the heirs with him of the same promise:
- 10 For he looked for a city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God.
- 11 Through faith also Sara herself received strength to conceive seed, and was delivered of a child when she was past age, because she judged him faithful who had promised.
- 12 Therefore sprang there even of one, and him as good as dead, so many as the stars of the sky in multitude, and as the sand which is by the sea shore innumerable.
- 13 These all died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them afar off, and were persuaded of them, and embraced them, and confessed that they were strangers and pilgrims on the earth.

Prepare Your Mind

The Jews' religious system was based on morality and ceremony. The Christian's faith is rooted in belief in God and His promises. The first-century church needed to teach Hebrew believers that salvation comes by grace through faith, the hope and belief of things unseen.

Faith has power to sustain believers in the midst of trials. Hebrews illustrates this by listing Old Testament heroes whose lives were remarkable because of their faith.

Prepare Your Heart

When the trials of life come, it's easy to feel hopeless. But God is always with us. The Bible has countless examples of individuals who found themselves in situations of uncertainty. This week's text names several who were faithful to God and obeyed Him. We also must remain faithful to God, even in the messiest of circumstances. He has a plan for our lives and will never abandon us.

Conversation Starter

Do you remember a time when you were scared or confused? What did you do?

Bible Lesson 5 15-20 min

Do you know who you can talk to when you feel scared or confused? (Allow responses.) You can talk to God. Even though you can't see Him, you can be sure He is close by and always ready to listen. The Bible tells us that God is real. And He never leaves your side because He loves you very much. Believing that God is real even though you can't see Him shows God that you love Him. So if you are sad, angry, or happy, you can talk to God about it anytime. God wants to hear about your day!

Faith is believing and trusting in something or someone. What would happen if I turn the light switch off? (Allow responses.) You can't see how the switch and the electricity work, but you have faith that the room will be dark. (Demonstrate.) We know that turning the light off and on will give us light or darkness. Faith in God is the same way. We can't see God, but we know that He is real. (Demonstrate.) The Bible tells us we can be sure that God is real.

Who has heard the Bible story about Noah? (Allow responses.) God told Noah to build an ark, a very big boat. (So Show picture of the ark with animals.) God said it would rain for days and days, so much that it would cause floods and destroy everything. But the ark would keep Noah and his family safe.

Do you remember what else was in the ark? (Allow responses.) That's right, the animals! They would also be safe. They wouldn't drown. (Pass out **animal crackers**.)

Do you remember why God was sending the rain? (Allow responses.) God was angry at the <u>sin</u> in the world, so He decided to destroy everything.

How do you think Noah felt when God told him to build the ark? (Allow responses.) Noah probably felt a little confused and scared. It was hard to imagine rain so strong that it would damage everything! Noah's friends probably laughed at him because they couldn't understand why he would need an ark.

But Noah was faithful to God. That means he believed what God told him about the rain and floods. Even though he couldn't see God, he knew it was important to <u>obey</u> Him. So that's what he did. He obeyed and built the ark. It was a lot of work, but when the rain started to fall, Noah, his family, and the animals were safe. <u>Because Noah was faithful to God and obeyed, God protected him.</u>

Another person in the Bible who was faithful to God was Abraham. God told Abraham to leave his home and move to a land that was far away. Abraham didn't know where God wanted him to go, but like Noah, he was faithful to God. He didn't ask God why he should move away. He just obeyed. He probably was confused and scared about where he would end up, but he trusted God. And because of his obedience, God rewarded him.

We can learn from the stories of Noah and Abraham. They show us that when you put your faith in God and trust Him, you will always please Him.



How do I know God is real if I can't see Him? That's where faith comes in. Having faith in God is knowing that He's very real and that He loves

Review Questions

- **1.** When you have faith in someone or something, what does that mean? (You believe and trust.)
- 2. Why did God protect Noah? (Noah obeyed God and was faithful to Him.)
- 3. What will always happen when you put your faith in God? (You will please Him.)

Explaining the Memory Verse

With faith, we believe that God is real, even though we can't see Him. God will be very happy when you put your faith in Him. You cannot please Him if you don't believe He's real.



Activity: Triangle of Faith 5-10 min

Read the memory verse aloud. Have the students stand in the shape of a triangle. Have the students on each side of the triangle recite one third of the verse. Once they are comfortable with their assigned portion of the verse, mix up the assignments for an extra challenge.

Next Steps

Christ Focus

Jesus believed God and obeyed Him perfectly.

Prayer Points

- Thank God for the students who are in your class. •
- Ask God to help the students know Jesus and always be faithful to Him.
